WHY TRUE SCIENCE SUPPORTS SCRIPTURE

Dictatorship of Relativism

From The Publisher

"Every day, so it sometimes feels to me, the messages arrive, in one clever, well-crafted form or another, telling our church people and our family members that what one believes doesn't really matter. They say that we are looking through an old stained, cracked, smoky glass."

Two Popes, one retired and one active, and both living in the Vatican. Paul Elie in his article in the May 2014 issue of *The Atlantic Monthly* discusses this amazing, historical and dramatic moment. The article entitled "The Pope in the Attic: Benedict in the Time of Francis" reveals that there are some issues surrounding this unusual situation. Elie examines the interesting paradox, *"For the first time in 600 years, we have a living ex-pope. What's it like to be Benedict, who now has to watch in silence as his successor--the man whose papacy he made possible-- cheerfully dismantles his legacy?"*

The article's focus is not altogether about the trivial sorts of things one could easily imagine, such as the proper protocol and the historic drama of the situation. Elie touches the more serious issues, and one could argue that these issues are not just "Catholic" in scope, but are pressing matters for the whole of modern Christianity's perceived importance as a life-changing, culturechanging force.

To date, Pope Francis's most shocking statement, in my view, and one which has grave consequences for the whole of Christian thought, is pointed out by Elie: "Who am I to judge?"—Francis's remark about gay people—was a sharp turn away from Benedict's view that the role of the Church is to render judgment in a world in thrall to 'a dictatorship of relativism.' Francis's offhand statements and openness to new approaches make clear that he is a very different pope—and unless Benedict has lost his mind, he cannot be altogether happy about it."

I read this article while flying with the UPCI Executive Board on a recent trip to Israel. We were guests of the State of Israel on a beautiful tour of many of the historical sites - a great time was had by all. I had been invited, while on an earlier trip to Israel in March of this year, to return to and visit an old and renowned monastery. On the March trip, while at the Jordan River, I was privileged to baptize a member of the monastery in Jesus name; and they had asked me to come speak to them about Pentecostalism. I slipped away from our group, accompanied by my wife Micki and daughter Jaye, and spent a day with the some of the leaders and sisters at the monastery where we had an insightful three-hour conversation about the modern Pentecostal revival and its significance as the means of establishing a new world theology. We discussed what I describe as a "reset" by taking a fresh look at the upper-room outpouring of the Holy Ghost. What came up (not explored but mutually understood) as one of the hindrances of any kind of global Spirit-revival is the issue of "relativism." Our talk kept bumping into the matter of authority.

What is applicable to our day? Who can say what? Who can judge? It took me back to the article I had just read on the plane. I mention this meeting only to point out that here we were, two worlds interacting together (Pentecostalism and Catholicism), each of us hungering for God's divine anointing, yet knowing that any revival, any convincing reading of the scripture, any sermon or Bible study's effectiveness stands or fall on the issue of relativism.

Once you begin to think, believe and advocate that the authority of the work of God is relative to something else – anything else – then such relativism becomes the dictator. Everything is then subject to the "dictatorship of relativism," as Elie puts it. If the word of God is not "forever settled," (Psalm 119:89) if we are prohibited from making any judgments based upon the word of God, then all is lost.

About Pope Francis's statement, Elie answers the question with a question: "'Who am I to judge?' Who, indeed? It is not a simple matter; it cannot be. In the end there is a need to judge and be judged, is there not? We are, he and I, successors to Peter, keeper of the keys to the kingdom. Who will judge, if not us?"

Any casual observer should be able to see that we are confronting a "Christian" world, not just the secular humanist world, which readily rejects the idea of truth and absolutes, including morals, values and doctrine in general. Many Christians even reject Jesus as the only Lord. The drivel that is being accepted and repeated on so-called "Christian" television is beyond belief. Are we so politically intoxicated that we have lost the ability to make a judgment, to make a call?

Welcome to a judgment-adverse world ruled by the dictatorship of relativism. Every day, so it sometimes feels to me, the messages arrive, in one clever, well-crafted form or another, telling our church people and our family members that what one believes doesn't really matter. They say that we are looking through an old stained, cracked, smoky glass. That our perception distorts what we see. Therefore, how can we really know or trust anything at all? Meaning is lost. It has all been warped with time. So, because we can't know what we can't know, we must just love God. Sometimes, the message is not disguised at all: it's summed up in a mere question. "Who am I to judge?" and "Who are you to judge?"

M. Ken Gurley, Pearland, TX – I think the most amazing miracle I witnessed was at the Azusa Centennial in Los Angeles. Our church had been asked by then General Superintendent Kenneth Haney to perform a play called "The Fire Still Falls," that recreated the backdrop of the Azusa Street Revival (1906-1909). During one of the performances, the Holy Ghost fell and we were unable to continue. Several hundred people received the baptism of the Holy Spirit, and a man paralyzed from his waist down saw God move

miraculously in his life. One of the women in the play, a medical doctor in our local church, was praying with the man who was in a wheelchair. In a few moments, the man began to struggle to his feet. Within minutes, he was walking across the altar area.

The message of the play was that God's Spirit still falls. Not only does the fire of the Spirit still move in our day, but the miracles, signs and wonders associated with a genuine Apostolic church are also operable in our midst. As the message of Azusa Street indicated, God is Savior, Spirit-Baptizer, Healer and Soon-Coming King.



Steven B. Waldron, Albany, GA – I was a young home missions pastor when I received a call one Sunday morning that one of our new converts had died and was still at the hospital. I asked our youth minister beside me, "Do you want to see God raise somebody from the dead?" He answered yes.

Once we got there, we found that he wasn't physically dead but brain dead. He had suffered a massive heart attack and was on life support. The doctors said the only things keeping him

alive were the machines. His wife was kissing him, telling him goodbye and that it was okay to leave. I had been doing some extensive fasting and felt incredible faith when I received the phone call. I was still sure God was going to raise him up. So we prayed. I then went back to service, believing God.

Going back that evening, Bro. Will was sitting up in bed. He was crying as I entered the room. He said, "Pastor, do you realize I was dead?" I assured him I did in fact know that. He knew a miracle had taken place, as did our church family. To God be the glory!



R. S. Carter, Staten Island, NY -- While preaching at a special anniversary service in Bronx, NY, the Lord placed a message on my heart entitled "Are you ready for your miracle?" I felt this was from the Lord. The services were on their way when I arrived. The assistant pastor announced he only had a few weeks to live because of cancer in his lungs. Immediately the Spirit witnessed to me that this was the person to receive the miracle.

Glen A. Stickler, Middletown, DE -- I was conducting a revival at a church in Cedar Lake, Indiana, pastored by Bro. G. T. Grinder. We prayed for a 12-year-old blind girl who came to the front of the church. After prayer she and her mom went back to their seats. I started preaching, and the mom of this 12-year-old girl began to shout and cry proclaiming that her daughter could see. Needless to say, this miraculous healing ignited a fire in that revival which resulted in numerous people receiving the Holy Ghost.

The most amazing miracle God allowed me to witness is the complete healing of my grandmother. She was taken to the hospital with bleeding issues. They took her to surgery and discovered she was eaten up with cancer. The doctor told the family she had a couple of weeks to live. My grandmother was a minister and demonstrated extraordinary faith in God. We all prayed and ministers across the country who knew her prayed. She lived an additional 10 years and one day just went to sleep and woke up on the other side of eternity.

David Reynolds, Florissant, MO -- I was building a barn, and I walked to the edge and bent down to put in a screw. The board under my foot gave way, and I was thrown. When I came to, my back was broken and I was paralyzed from my waist down. I still remember lying in the hospital with my pastor, wife, son-in-law and brothers in the church -- all praying for a miracle. At about 5:30, the doctor came and suddenly said to the group,

"Keep praying -- it's working." I was transported to another hospital where there was a doctor who specialized in back injuries. He operated on me and put in two 12" rods along my back hoping it would fuse. I was placed in a full body cast and in the hospital for three weeks. My back is now fused around the rods. God has been good to me!



J. Kurtis Burton, Nashville, TN – Recently, we made up 100 prayer cloths with our church logo to be anointed with oil and passed out to the needs of the congregation. One was sent to a girl who was expecting her first child. The ultrasound showed the back part of the baby's skull was not developed and there would be serious challenges at birth, even death. Much prayer was given, and our prayer cloth was sent the week of testing. The doctor came in and was amazed because

Adhering to the philosophy that "this is anyone's church," Bro. Wright and the members of Cornerstone Tabernacle welcome everyone regardless of race, economic background or educational status. "We are all here by the grace of God," said Bro. Wright. "Everyone we meet, or anyone that comes to Cornerstone Tabernacle, is treated with the same respect. We realize that the person we see initially is in the beginning stages of greatness, and what God needs from us is to love them right where they are until He is able to refine and mold them into a finished product. "We strive to have exciting Spirit-filled and Spirit-led services,

"We strive to have exciting Spirit-filled and Spirit-led services, with an emphasis on fulfilling the first commandment spoken in Mark 12:30, 'And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength,'" Bro. Wright said. "We strive to have a well-rounded church with something for everyone: children, teens and adults."

Personal History

Growing up in Flint, Michigan, one of the most economically challenged areas in the United States, Bro. Wright knew it was easy to be consumed by the streets and what they seemed to offer. Losing many friends to violence and seeing many more locked away, he knew something would have to change or he would wind up as just another statistic. "In the end it was a huge factor in my conversion," said Bro. Wright. "I knew that there had to be more to life than what was being offered by the world."

He was invited to church initially by a co-worker, Michelle. The efforts of this young woman ultimately led to Bro. Wright being born again. "The person who witnessed to me, and was my initial contact to this great gospel, is now my wife," said Bro. Wright. "Michelle and I will celebrate 25 years of marriage this year."

The Wrights have two children who play an integral role in the life of the church. Their daughter, Alexis, is one of the youth leaders of Cornerstone Tabernacle and is in charge of multi-media as well as working in the administration department of the church. Their son, Douglas, is involved in the music department and is the church drummer as well.

After receiving the Holy Ghost in 1986, Bro. Wright began a journey that seemed to him too good to be true. Upon his conversion, he was privileged to work in many facets of the church under Pastor Robert E. Henson of South Flint Tabernacle. His duties included ushering, singing in the choir, working as the groundskeeper, helping with outreach, as well as working in Sunday school. Bro. Wright was happy to help fill any need his pastor had. Along this journey, he served as the assistant Sunday school superintendent, head greeter, youth pastor, and became a leader of outreach at the local prison.

"I owe my pastor so much for taking me and so many others under his wing," Bro. Wright explains. "He challenged us, taught us and believed in us, whereas in many cases nobody else did. He literally poured hours upon hours into my life, guiding my journey through each and every step of ministry. To this day he is still the one constant in my life that I look to not only for support but accountability as well. In this age, you cannot put a value on a true man of God who imparts so much of himself into you, and will tell you what you need to hear and not what you want to hear. Along with my pastor and first lady who helped my wife along this journey, I could not begin to put into words what my home church did for me. They were there and supported our efforts every step of the way, and I am indebted to them for life."

Principles of Growth and Revival

Known for their friendliness, Cornerstone Tabernacle attracts many visitors simply by word of mouth. "Helping people understand that they can live an overcoming Christian life on a daily basis helps us to realize that in doing so we will not only affect ourselves but our families and communities in the process," said Bro. Wright. "I believe the essential requirement for a growing church is that before you launch into outreach, you must spend quality time on 'in reach.' By this, I mean we must prepare the church body to receive what will come through the doors in revival, as well as focusing on their personal growth before trying to reach others. I think a revival pastor needs to place his emphasis on his core leaders, instilling a passion in them for the vision that he has for the church. In turn, they will graft his vision into their everyday walk with God, propelling it to others."

As far as growth is concerned, Cornerstone Tabernacle has utilized a variety of methods and many have been truly successful such as picnics in the parking lot, friend day, baby dedications, dinners, turkey give-a-ways, etc. "As a church we must understand that the seeds we plant may take time to grow, but in God's time it will come to pass," Bro. Wright said.

Personal Ministry

Crediting any success to his Creator, Bro. Wright bases everything he does on one small principle: never forgetting where God has brought him from. "If not for the Lord, where would I be?" said Bro. Wright. "I am not any better than anyone else, but God still saw fit to save me. I can never repay Him, but with every waking moment, my goal is to try. I lead with this same philosophy."

Bro. Wright said he spends 90 percent of Sundays preaching on hope. "I end every service with a high intensity altar call that focuses on those that are in need of something that they have not found before but are in desperate need of," he explains. "On Wednesday

nights, I focus on strengthening the infrastructure of the church or any other pressing needs. I also take time to do pastoral Bible studies at least four times per year, and oftentimes I teach a short series on a particular subject of interest.

"No matter how great a vision a man has, if the church does not buy into it, it will not work. I commend Cornerstone Tabernacle for buying in whole-heartedly to my vision as their pastor."

Organization and Management

Bro. Wright believes that every group is a target group, and he has assembled a great ministerial team committed to reaching the lost. "We have department heads but in name only," Bro. Wright explains.

"Commitment begins and ends with the lost. We meet the needs of the individual now, and then we will sort out their particular grouping later."

Cornerstone Tabernacle has many exciting ministries, including Sunday School, Youth Ministry, Men's Ministry, Ladies Ministry, Outreach, Spanish Ministry, Charity, and Music Ministry.

"I believe that the success of a particular department is not in the mandatory meetings, but in the personal level of relationship that the pastor has with them other than just leadership," said Bro. Wright. "Your relationship as a pastor with your leadership team must be about the lives of your leaders, not just their ministry. In fellowship with your leaders such as taking them out for coffee, going on a hospital visitation, or cleaning the church with them, you will help them to emulate your leadership qualities. You must keep a personal level of communication with your leaders other than just about church matters."

He conducts department head meetings four times per year, and no less than three times per year he conducts special training for all of the department heads. "Each and every leader has a clear-cut job description, which begins and ends with my vision for the church," explains Bro. Wright. "Before we launch any ministry, my wife and I will lead that ministry for the first year, setting an example. Once a leader is chosen for the department, we work closely with them and over time give them more and more liberty until their ministry takes root. At that point, we can step back and watch them lead from afar. "In training our leadership, it's a 50/50 division. I want them

"In training our leadership, it's a 50/50 division. I want them to understand and do their job to the best of their ability, and I want to be sure they are trained to do so. More so than the training, I teach them about the love of God for the lost and that the ministry they are undertaking is a privilege."

Once new converts make the decision to live an overcoming life and have fulfilled the plan of salvation, Bro. Wright instantly involves them in some type of ministry, giving them accountability and making them feel like a vital part of the church. "They may start out with the task of washing the baptismal towels and gowns, taking attendance, folding bulletins, or even washing windows," said Bro. Wright. "In time their ministry will develop and they will want to do more for God as well as form a relationship with the membership of the church."

Church History

Cornerstone Tabernacle was founded approximately 10 years ago; there were two pastors prior to Bro. Wright's installation in 2008. The building consists of a sanctuary that can hold about 550 people, a fellowship hall that can seat 175, along with seven offices, a library, a nursery, seven classrooms, a kitchenette, prayer room, baptismal room and a media room. There is also additional office space and classrooms that will eventually be used for after-school programs, along with a host of adult educational programs.

"We conducted our first service in Holland on May 4, 2008," said Bro. Wright. "We had 22 in attendance and met in a 3,000 square foot building. In June of 2010, we purchased a 28,000 square foot building where we now conduct services. This facility is located on one of the main throughways of our city. We now average 275 to 300 people in service on Sundays, and this past Easter we had a record attendance of 428 in service."

Vision for the Future

Bro. Wright and Cornerstone Tabernacle are excited about their future in Holland. "Our vision is to continue spreading our works into different areas of the city, through future daughter works and various ministries," said Bro. Wright. "We look forward to reaching into our city and offering people hope."

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Connect Purposefully With Guests

Your God is awesome. Your church is wonderful. Yet guests who visit your church don't often return. No true connection was made. Why not challenge *every member* of your church to use these seven tips to connect with guests?

1. Make a personal commitment to intentionally connect with one guest every Sunday. Ask God to make you aware of visitors. Be diligently alert—in the parking lot, foyer, nursery, hallway, worship service to notice them. If you accidentally welcome someone who isn't a guest, that's no problem. You've found a new friend.



2. Once you've found a possible newcomer, pray for God's guidance. Smile, greet the guest warmly, and introduce yourself. Pay careful attention to his or her name. Repeat it. Write it down. You will want to call them by name next Sunday when they return.

3. Chat casually and purposefully. You may ask, "Is this your first time to worship here?" Ask nonintrusive questions such as, "Did you just move to town?" or "What brought you to church today?" Warning: Never ask "Are you a native here?" That reeks of cliquism and warns the guest they aren't welcome unless they're from your town.


4. As you chat, listen carefully to find things you have in common. Most importantly, offer friendship. Make a plan to get together this week. For example: Invite them to join you for lunch today, meet for coffee Monday, or be your guest at an upcoming church event.

5. Give the guest your email or phone number, and ask for their contact info. Call them Tuesday to remind them of the kids' Wednesday program or on Saturday to say, "I hope you come back again tomorrow. I'll save you a seat!"

6. Help the guest to connect with at least one other person at the church. As you converse, think of someone who has a common interest (i.e., children's ages, similar life stage, employment, neighborhood, hobbies or background). Introduce them.
7. Say these words before the guest departs: "We want you here!"

hungry. They should always have the opportunity to live each and every day with hope that they can have a better life than the one into which they were born. You help to make that possible.


Will you pray about responding with a financial gift so we can continue to help young people like these mentioned? More and more children are calling to us. Each of them are in need of a loving home, a good



Interviewed By Iscah Spina



Sis. Nancy Arrowood Seymour, IN

I wanted a life like he and his family shared. I guess you could say that I fell in love with the ministry at a young age.

When did you first

feel the call of God

10 years old. My

with my pastor's.

What steps did you take as a young person to grow in the Lord? My pastor told me to read a chapter a day in my Bible and to pray every day when I was 10. Those things just became a habit. I tried to never miss church and the good saints of my home church carted me back and forth very faithfully. Later, I went to Apostolic Bible Institute. That was the right place for me to learn and also to find my husband. He was a man following hard after God. Daily, I observed his commitment and dedication. He was never late for classes or missed any classes. He was diligent with his studies and church attendance. He worked a job and kept his school bill paid. All those things impressed me. I believe looking for a husband with these qualities was key in my being in ministry today.

When and where did you and Bro. Arrowood first pastor? We assisted three pastors out of Bible college. We learned a lot. We began pastoring in Frankfort, Indiana when my husband was 29.

What were your expectations of being a pastor's wife and were they correct? I felt I wasn't qualified because of my limited musical ability. I decided to try teaching. I loved it. I determined to teach every age group for at least three months. I thought

then that I could be understanding of each age and assist our teachers in reaching the children in their classes. It was a joyful endeavor.

Four-year-olds were the most challenging. It took six months with that group for me. However by then, I felt such a love and connection with that age group that it was difficult to go to another. As the years have passed I think the most important thing I can do for my husband, myself, and my church is to pray. I was wrong in the beginning to think I had to be musically inclined.

What would you say are some of the most important qualities that a pastor's wife should have? Number one is to love the Lord with your whole heart. Secondly, love people. No one should be in ministry who doesn't love people. I believe loving people/children is the bedrock of successful teaching. If you love them, you will find a way to help them.

What is the key to balancing church and **home?** It is something that has to be worked at, sometimes daily. It is so easy to be guilt-ridden all the time. We can never do enough, it seems. So especially now I have to be realistic about what I can handle and pace myself. It is a great blessing to me that my husband is affirming and understanding. He reminds me that we are in this for the long haul and not a weekend trip. We have been in ministry together 42 years.

What does an average day look like for you as a pastor's wife? I like to rise early and do the most important thing first - prayer and Bible reading. The whole day is so much sweeter, no matter the activities, if I start the day right. There is peace on my pillow at night that way too. I love being available to people. I especially enjoy being with our younger ministers and wives. I work at the church office several days a week. With our day care and school it is a beehive of activity. It is fun. I love it.

What advice would you give to a young

pastor's wife? I believe a pastor's wife's first responsibility is to take excellent care of her husband. "No squabbles on the way to church" is a good rule. Protect him as much as possible from any appearance of evil. Guard him from foolish women who have no clue about propriety. Make your home a place of order, peace and joy. Give him a refuge to retreat to. Take care of his physical needs so he isn't as vulnerable to the devices of the enemy. Love the ministry and don't be jealous of the attention he must give to others. See yourself as a priceless part of your husband's success. Don't be in competition with him. Every accolade he receives is attributed to you too.

Have you ever written any books and if

I have written one small book to encourage others to journal entitled Consider the Lilies. It shares my journey of personal thoughts, feelings and prayers, with the goal of leading other ladies to journal also. Each example was selected with a specific type of prayer in mind.

I begin my personal devotion time with scripture reading. While reading I look for a scripture or thought that I can apply to my life or use to understand God better. In my meditation I record thoughts in my prayer journal. Following that, I pray, often incorporating what I have studied in my prayer. I also record many of my prayers, which forces me to focus completely on what I am saying. Through this exercise my devotion time has been greatly enhanced. I pray all who read my journal will seek to obtain a better understanding of the God they love and serve.

Transgender Tipping Point

Pastors often ask me what I think will be the next "big issue" to affect America and the church. Satan's attacks are a flood against culture and traditional values making it hard to pinpoint just one area that will prove problematic for the church. I do believe, however, that while we have grown

Why has there been a push away from holiness in our pews?

This is a complex issue and deserves more space than the small allotment of this article space, but let me point to a few things. First, the pew is often reflective of the pulpit.

Boooy Rullion Because of the false and shallow charges of legalism, pulpits can be intimidated away from addressing these things. If you do say something is "conservative," or what I call just biblical, be ready to be attacked. That's the climate we are living in and the spirit of the age working against us. Paul was clear though in saying he was free from the blood of all men because he had not shunned from declaring the full counsel of God. That means as ministers and preachers we are accountable for what we preach AND don't preach.

But let me get to more fertile grounds of discussion. How has the average church member been moved? It cannot be only laid at the feet of silent pulpits – as egregious as that is when true. In every home in Israel, every Friday before Sabbath, Proverbs 31 was read. So, in every home in Israel at least once a week what a godly woman should be was lifted up and praised. The problem is now that through entertainment and marketing the pattern of the world, and what it means to be woman, is being defined both in more volume and more clarity from our culture. Instead of godly examples we have lifted up other things in our homes and it's no wonder our women and daughters are struggling with issues of beauty.

Media is a powerful teaching force and a \$250 billion dollar a year business in just the US. The average American is exposed to 3000 ads a day and will spend two years of their life watching TV commercials. The fascinating thing is everyone feels personally exempt from the force of advertising. But the Editorin-Chief of Advertising Age said, "Only 8% of an ad's message is received by the conscious mind. The rest is worked and reworked deep within the recesses of the brain." So, these ads stay with us working subconsciously, creating an environment in which we all "swim in" like fish. It's hard to stay healthy and have godly standards if our minds are swimming constantly in a toxic environment. That's the subconscious effect.

The reality of marketing on the mind of the people in the pew must be exposed. There are quite a few resources to teach and preach from but if one hasn't read a book like The Marketing of Evil they are behind on understanding these real forces. Our job is to not be silent in the pulpit and to expose the attacks of our day by showing where they are entering our lives at home. It might be good to start reading things like Proverbs 31 again as a healthy alternative while we also remove the competing ideas.

In my opinion, our church lacks focus. The various ministries all seem to be doing their own thing and the end result is everyone going a dozen different directions with little being accomplished.

Your thoughts on how to fix this?

Only the pastor can set the overall vision and direction for the church. So, from your statement, there appears to be the need for an annual planning session with all the departments and ministries in which the direction for the coming year is clearly spelled out and all the various ministries all work together to see that vision realized. This involves goal setting, vision casting, and group planning so that everyone knows what exactly we will, by faith, accomplish by the end of the year.

It is important that we "clarify the win" as Andy Stanley writes in his well-received book, *Seven Practices of Effective Ministry* (Multnomah Publishers, 2004). He writes, "Most churches do not have a reliable system for defining and measuring what success looks like at every level of the organization." For people to be successful, they need to know their ultimate aim and purpose. They need to know how God and the pastor define "success." For example, what is the primary purpose of the Youth Department? Social events? Fund raising? Youth evangelism? Great youth services? Or is it to see the youth of your church grow and mature into solid, productive Christians that contribute to the growth and success of the church? When every department and ministry knows their primary purpose, then every departmental activity can be designed to help further that goal and achieve good success.

Every church activity and event should be planned by asking, "what do we want people to walk away and do?" What we plan should always help us acccomplish the two ultimate goals of the church within this dispensation: Win the Lost and Perfect The Saints. Our Lord will say "well done" if do these well.

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

stinkin' thinkin'.) Are we as a church body becoming equipped to be healing helpers? People can be saved but deeply wounded by sexual abuse, dysfunctional family relationships, divorce, pornography addiction, etc.

Do you know why a sexual abuse victim may be a "cutter"? Do you wonder why a young "sweet" teen becomes rebellious and promiscuous? Do you know why a young person withdraws from everyone? These are just a few symptoms of a sexual abuse victim. Many are exposed to porn before, during or after the sexual abuse. There is always a reason behind unusual extreme acting out.

Some church leaders have not exposed the sexual abuse and help the perpetrator in the church blame this atrocity on the victim! Does God Want His People To Invest?

To answer this question, let's look at the parable of the talents in the book of Matthew. I don't want to take the time to reiterate the entire

story here, so I strongly encourage you to read it for yourself. Before I get into the story, you need to understand what is meant by a talent. In biblical times, a talent was a very large measure of money. So when the story talks about people being entrusted with a talent, it means that they were being entrusted with a very large amount of wealth. Understand that this story is talking about spiritual things as well. This story is talking about investing the life God gave us in eternity and in living for Him but is also talking about money.



Revival Concepts

Understanding Anointing "Thou hast loved righteousness, and hated iniquity; therefore God, even thy God, HATH ANOINTED THEE WITH the oil of gladness

above thy fellows" - Hebrews 1:9.

Oh to be anointed! That should be the cry of every minister and believer. But what does it mean to be anointed? The Greek word for "anointed" in Hebrews 1:9 is *chrio*. It means that by contact someone is consecrated to an office or religious service. This is the work of the Holy Spirit.

Not only do we need the anointing, we need the different kinds of anointing. Hebrews 1:9 is not talking about an apostleship, prophetic or pastoral anointing. The text clearly is talking about an anointing of "gladness," which means there is more than one kind of anointing.

Every minister has his own anointing that God hath anointed him with. And though we may try to be all things to all men, the reality is there is a fivefold ministry of apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers (Eph. 4:11). These gifts are intended to bless the body, causing maturity in the believers and growth in the churches as they operate Biblically. How burdensome it is, both to the individual and others, when someone ignores the other gifts God has given and doesn't allow the anointing of those gifts from God to flow in his or her life.

Just today I had a discussion with a great pastor. He asked me about the successes we have been seeing the Lord give in the Harvest Conferences we conduct. I told him, "You are anointed for things I simply am not anointed for. But there are things I am anointed for that you are not. We need each other." Readily, that revival-minded pastor agreed.

A whole city was converted to Jesus Christ due to the ministry of the first N.T. evangelist and his anointing (Acts 8). If we are to be as fruitful as God intends in our ministries we must learn to allow other people's anointing to operate Biblically. Without it we will never experience the level of revival, fruitfulness and growth Jesus intends to give us. I want what God wants. I want the level of revival, fruitfulness and growth Jesus wants to give me.

I have been asked to become a member of the Board of Directors of our church. Is there anything I need to know regarding serving in this position before I accept?

Yes, below is a list of items that you should be able to answer prior to serving. Serving is an honor but also a responsibility, so you need to be sure you can agree to meet the needs of the position of a board member and can give your time and efforts to serving.

- 1. Do you agree with the overall mission and objective of the organization and do you feel you can contribute by being on the board?
- 2. Can you honestly work with the leadership without being disagreeable?
- 3. Can you accept the overall decision of the board even though you personally may not agree with the issue?
- 4. Do you accept the description of a board member and can you fulfill the responsibilities as stated?
- Can you work in harmony with the other board members and staff and refrain from discussing the issues with anyone else (including your spouse)?

In addition, you should be aware of the following:

- 1. How often does the board meet?
- 2. Are you provided with information about the finances of the organization?
- 3. Does the organization operate within an annual budget and does the board review it and approve it annually?
- 4. Does the organization have an annual membership business meeting?
- 5. Does the organization have an annual review of its financial statement?
- 6. Are the corporate resolutions/policies upto-date and how often are they reviewed?
- 7. Have the by-laws been reviewed within the past 3-5 years to bring them up-to-date?
- Is there a system of checks and balances to prevent conflicts of interest between the board and the organization?
- Does the board have adequate director's and officer's liability insurance?
- 10. Has the board been indemnified with an official document of indemnification?

master bragging that he did not lose any of it. The master was pleased with the servants who had invested but became very angry with the servant who had done nothing but hidden the one talent with which he was entrusted. The master told the servant that at the very least he should have put it in the bank so it would earn some interest.

This story tells us, without question, that God not only wants His people to invest, He wants them to invest wisely. You cannot argue this point. The story clearly states that the servant with only one talent was reprimanded and ultimately punished for not investing the master's money. You could argue that this story is strictly referring to spiritual things, but if investing were not part of God's plan for our money, would He have used it as an illustration in this parable?

MD Man Claims College Rejected Him For Expressing Faith in God

A Maryland man is suing the Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC) for a first amend-



ment violation after the school allegedly rejected him for

professing his faith in God. Brandon Jenkins claims that during a Spring 2013 admissions interview, a CCBC staff member asked, "What is the most important thing to you?" Jenkins answered, "My God."

He was denied admission into their radiation therapy program shortly afterward. When Jenkins asked for more information regarding the rejection, program director Adrienne Doughtery explained that it was due to more qualified applicants, and because of his spiritual answer.

"I understand that religion is a major part of your life and that was evident in your recommendation letters; however, this field is not the place for religion," Dougherty allegedly wrote in an email.

"We have many patients who come to us for treatment from many different religions and some who believe in nothing. If you interview in the future, you may want to leave your thoughts and beliefs out of the interview process."

Jenkins, represented by the American Center for Law and Justice, filed suit recently in the U.S. District Court of Maryland. He is seeking admittance into the radiation therapy program and unspecified monetary damages.

GOVERNMENT TRENDS

IRS Confirms Abortions Eligible For Tax Deduction

In a list of odd tax deductions, the Washington Examiner pointed out that women who have an abortion are eligible to get a tax deduction. And while pro-abortion advocates hyperventilate over Hobby Lobby not wanting to provide every type of birth control without a copay, it turns out that birth control pills can be deducted if prescribed by a doctor. Also, a person reportedly can deduct the purchase of pregnancy test kits and vasectomies.



Evangelicals Admit Finding Time for Daily Bible Reading and Prayer a Struggle

New research has shed light on the difficulties evangelicals have in making time for their spiritual life. In particular, the Evangelical Alliance's study found that evangelicals struggle to find time for both reading the Bible and praying each day.

Of the over 1,500 surveyed, nearly all (90 percent) said they read the Bible regularly, but only 31 percent said they set aside a substantial period of time each day to pray.

Although 87 percent agreed that every Christian needs to spend time alone with God on a daily basis, and that without that their faith will suffer, 42 percent said they find it difficult to find time on a regular disciplined basis to pray and read the Bible.

Nearly a fifth (18 percent) said they do not have a fixed pattern of prayer but rather pray when the chance or need arises. This figure rises to 29 percent among those born after 1980

Over half of those surveyed (60 percent) said they prayed "on the move," while walking or using transport. When they do find the time to pray, evangelicals are most likely to be asking God to bless their family (49 percent).

Older people (those born before 1960) are significantly more disciplined and structured in their prayer patterns," the Alliance noted.

Nearly two-thirds (63 percent) admitted to being easily distracted when spending time with God and while most (88 percent) agreed it was important for a Christian to read or study the Bible on a daily basis, in practice only half are managing to do this. Another 40 percent said they read the Bible several times each week.

There was a substantial difference in Bible engagement between older and younger Christians, with 60 percent of those born before 1960 managing to read their Bible daily, compared to just 31 percent of younger Christians.

Tellingly, busy Martha was the Bible character evangelicals were most likely to say they identified with (43 percent).

'She was selected almost three times more than her contemplative sister Mary, indicating that busy lifestyles are a widespread feature of contemporary discipleship," the Alliance said.

NEWS IN BRIEF

According to recent research by The Center for the Study of Theological Education at Auburn Seminary, seminary graduates face suffocating debt. Many students graduating in 2011 with a master's of divinity degree exited with a debt load of more than \$40,000, and around 5% had debts totaling more than \$80,000. To survive, the graduates or their

spouses took second or even third jobs.

Photographers can now be forced to work gay weddings, the United States Supreme Court decided by silence recently. The justices reportedly ignored an opportunity to reaffirm the basic principle that the government can't trample on fundamental rights of free speech and religion.

LEGAL TRENDS FL Student Forced to Stop Reading Bible in Free Time

A Florida teacher is facing a lawsuit after forcing a 12-year-old student to call his parents for reading his Bible

during free reading time. Giovanni Rubeo, a student at Park Lakes Elementary School in Ft.

Lauderdale, had brought out his Bible for free reading time in February and March of this year, and had been told to put it away.

When Giovanni's father heard of this, he determined that his son should be able to read religious material under his constitutional rights. Rubeo told his son to call him if the teacher told him to stop reading his Bible again.

This time, the teacher ordered Giovanni to call his parents in front of the class and proceeded to leave a message. "I noticed that he has a book -- a religious book -- in the classroom. He's not permitted to read those books in my classroom," the teacher said in the recording.

Religious liberty attorneys at the Liberty Institute are representing the Rubeo family. They are pushing for students to be allowed to read religious material during free reading time; they also are asking for a letter of apology for the incident.

This is the most shocking piece of evidence I've seen in the 12 years of religious liberty work that I've been doing," said Liberty Institute director of litigation Hiram Sasser.

Science is the discovery of the natural world. Science has been used to benefit mankind. But since man has an inherent sinful nature, it is also used in a variety of ways to destroy God's creation. Since the days of Copernicus, Galileo and Spinoza, a tension has existed many times between science and the Bible. On occasion the established Church had a misunderstanding of the Bible, and hence persecuted true science, such as with the geocentric model of the Universe. Slowly, with the collapse of Christian culture in the West, the tables have turned. No longer does the institutionalized Church sometimes persecute science. The scientific worldview which permeates so much of modern culture, at the U.N. and in the U.S. especially, is at war with Biblical Christianity. Accommodation with the naturalistic worldview leads to capitulation and destruction for true Christianity. We have the truth. Our goal is to proclaim it. And true science, rightly interpreted, will always confirm the Bible.

Science

The Encyclopedists of Europe in the 1750s, fueled by Voltaire's scathing rebuke of Church and Christianity, began to actively search for a worldview to replace Christianity in the popular mind. Men such as James Hutton, Comte de Buffon and Erasmus Darwin, among many others, began to promulgate a worldview that would later become what is known as the Theory of Evolution. This atheistic mindset sought any means to replace the God of the Bible with human reason. This is called the Enlightenment, but in reality was leading into a new dark world devoid of objective truth and ethics. James Billington, Librarian of Congress, has written an amazing tome detailing the advance of this grim philosophical contagion, beginning from the coffee shops of Europe in the 1770s to the killing fields of communism in the 20th century.

The great scientific advancements of our modern day are not due to belief in evolution as a mechanism for the upward transmigration and transmutation of species. As a matter of fact, it is a stultifying influence on true science. Our prophesied explosion of knowledge, as foretold in Daniel 12:4, can be traced to the bevy of Christian scientists beginning primarily in the 17^{th} century who "thought God's thoughts after Him" and gave us the scientific keys for the mastery of so much of the world around us. Dr. Henry Morris, in his great book Men of Science, Men of God, details how each sphere of the massive technological exponation of the past 100+ years has its roots in Bible-believing scientists. Isaac Newton wrote more on the Bible than he did science. This is amazing, considering he co-founded Calculus, discovered the laws of Physics, Gravity, Motion, Optics and so much more. He is considered by many to be the greatest scientist who ever lived. Louis Pasteur of France fought Charles Darwin, and actually delivered the death blow to Darwinism with his ingenious disproval of spontaneous generation. All current, beneficial spheres of science had their beginning with the work of scientists operating under the assumption of a Biblical worldview

If macroevolution were true, it would not have to be continually buttressed and propped up by lies. Each of the "icons of evolution," which are the best arguments in favor of evolution, have been consistently shown to be misleading and falsified. Take the "missing links" over the years. Nebraska Man, Piltdown Man, Heidelberg Man, Java Man, Peking Man, Australopithecus, Lucy etc. have all been shown to be either severely lacking in evidence or contrary evidence was covered up, or they were shown to be deliberate hoaxes. Entire books are fielded showing the culpability of these frauds. Yet, in the popular mind, in college textbooks and classrooms, in documentaries and on internet resources, they and others are constantly trotted out as proofs of evolution. Just a little digging below the surface shows them to be highly suspect at best, and deliberately fraudulent at worst.

Other supposed proofs of evolution that have been discredited or had doubt highly cast upon them are: the supposed ability to create amino acids replicating conditions of the early earth, Phylogeny recapitulates Ontogeny, Archaeopteryx, peppered moths, fossil horses, and Darwin's Tree of Life. As an example, Darwin conveniently postulated that Precambrian fossils had been destroyed by heat or another process, since the Cambrian explosion showed all fossils fully formed with no intermediate species.

Darwin's only degree was a Bachelors of Theology. He wanted to believe in God when younger; it seems obvious when reading his autobiography. But during his five-year voyage on the HMS Beagle, he read the wrong books and began to see God's remarkable creation around him thru non-creationist lenses. He shared many of his thoughts through the years but was compelled to write them when a young challenger, Alfred Wallace, had come to nearly the same conclusions as him. In November of 1859, a book that was to forever negatively change the

world was published: *The Origin of Species*. Darwin's deadly legacy was the basis of a collapse of morals, and eventually, as he said in his 1871 book, the descent of man. Man was no longer a special creation by God, endowed with an eternal soul but merely an animal, according to Darwin. Darwin of course led to Nietzsche. And Nietzsche's ideas of political will, the death of God and the birth of superman gave rise to Hitler. Even Hitler's philosophical road map was called "Mein Kampf," which means "my struggle," a direct link to Darwinism.

Seemingly all fields of endeavor in the modern world have been tainted with Darwinism, with the possible exception of basic math. In the legal field, law is constantly changing. It is no longer based on absolutes but an evolutionary metaphysic. Marriage, morality and government are based on changeability and not the authority of the Word of God. Freudian psychology says man invented God. The healthcare industry now has quality of life provisions, instead of each life being precious. Abortion is used as birth control, with no consideration of the life of the child which science has fully confirmed as human and functioning. All things are now mutable and pliable and not confined to the dictates of God, all according to an evolutionary naturalistic worldview. Racism, of course, uses evolution as a justification, just as Darwin did.

What Is To Be Done?

Truth has its own power. Lenin said facts are stubborn things, when trying to introduce his evolutionary-based communist ethic in Russia. As people of truth, our greatest weapon against the errors of evolution, that have even infected our own ranks, is to speak the truth in love. It is a great comfort that when we speak of an inerrant Bible and the Creation narrative found therein, we not only know that it is intrinsically true, but the weight of evidence is on our side! All science, properly interpreted, confirms the truth of the Bible.

Evidences Biblical Creationism

Symbiosis is an incontrovertible evidence of Biblical creation. Life is dependent upon other life. If the odds of evolution are impossible according to normal statistical analysis, requiring far more chance than the number of electrons in the universe, how could two of every species evolve at approximately the same time, with almost no variation, with one having the capacity to bear seed, and the other with a convenient womb? Not just a man and woman mind you, but perfect pairs of sheep, deer, elephants, cows, dogs, cats, etc. It sounds an awful lot like creation as mentioned in Genesis 1. As a matter of fact, that is the only explanation!

Bees require flowers. Flowers require bees. They would have had to evolve at identically the same time, each with that capacity of need and provision for what the other needed and provided. It sounds like instant special creation.

It requires so much faith to be an evolutionist. Satan is the father of lies. And he has authored this well-crafted scheme to dethrone and debunk God. Atheists have proclaimed loudly for decades that if Genesis chapters 1-3 are shown to be false, there is no basis for Christianity. Why? Because the reason for Jesus is to save us from the effects of Adam's sin. No Adam, no need for Jesus. Rats who have their tails cut off to a thousand generations are still born with tails, because the outward removal of the tail has no effect on the DNA. The inheritance of acquired characteristics is a pillar of macroevolution, and it does not stand.

Darwin knew the eye baffled him. It shouldn't exist in

evolutionary theory. As a matter of fact, almost no parts of complex creatures should exist according to evolution. Why? If evolution says that beneficial mutations are passed on from generation to generation, gradually becoming better and more refined, the eye is a closed system as are most systems of complex organisms. A blob of eye tissue would serve no purpose before it was fully functioning, and therefore would not be passed down but eradicated as useless in a partial state. It is the same for other systems in our bodies as well. A partial liver is useless. A third of a circulatory system doesn't function. A mass of brain cells not connected as the nerve center of the body is useless. In Darwinian theory, these should have been expunged during the generational evolutionary theory as unnecessary and detrimental. Mankind, as are all complex life forms, are closed systems. They are all or nothing systems. Unless formed complete, they are utterly useless. This is yet another of literally thousands of evidences for Biblical creationism for which evolutionary science has no answer.

The design inference is obvious to anyone who takes the time to objectively take a look at the matter. Francis Collins began as an atheist, when heading the Human Genome Project. Even the atheist Richard Dawkins now agrees that design had to be used in creation, but he looks for the design from aliens instead of Jesus.

Conclusion

The world's foremost atheist Antony Flew, when confronted with the evidence, finally said there had to be a God. Forty percent of all philosophy professors in the U.S. now believe in God. The number was 1% in the 1960s. Why the upward surge? Because the evidence is overwhelming. We have the truth! Keep praying, preaching and loving! Compromise in this area will leaven the entire Gospel. This world needs to see the real Apostolic Pentecostal Church in action, not some watered-down charade of accommodation. It is not always easy. The way is daunting sometimes. And it seems the entire world's system is against truth, and ridicules it. But truth is always truth, it is always right, and it is always liberating. And it is the hope for this world. If God is right in Genesis chapters 1-3, then He's right at Calvary, He's right in the upper room on the Day of Pentecost, He's right about judgment to come and a Heaven to gain and a hell to shun. 
An elderly couple is lying in bed one morning, having just awakened from a good night's sleep. The husband takes his wife by the hand and she responds, "Don't touch me."
