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There Is a Crack In Everything

"The cracking foundations are clearly visible in the culture and in the church. One does not need the perfect song or the perfect sermon before getting involved. However, we do need the perfect passion to speak, to vote, and to attend meetings."

"There is a crack in everything." We would hope, of course, that this is not true; however, it is clear that society is experiencing revolutionary shifts in almost every area: politics, religion, communication, social constructs, education, science... and the list goes on. Let us not ignore the opportunity for a positive response, even when the situation is dreadful.

"Ring the bells that still can ring Forget your perfect offering There is a crack in everything That's how the light gets in."

These words from poet and songwriter Leonard Cohen are a powerful challenge to do *something*. Do *something* now! Ungodliness and the rejection of God's Word have cracked the foundations of humanity. If we are wise we will grasp this as an opportunity not to merely cower in defense, but we must see this as a time when the light can get in – a time of great illumination and ultimately revival is within reach. Compromise is not a solution. We cannot stand wringing our hands, trying to negotiate our position or bog down in the endless pursuit of perfection, trying to make flawless presentations. We cannot craft our own response to the problems that the world faces today. We must, "Ring the bell that still can ring."

This will not be an easy task. God gave a similar challenge to Moses, and even his response was reticence. "And Moses said unto the Lord, O my Lord, I am not eloquent, neither heretofore, nor since thou hast spoken unto thy servant: but I am slow of speech, and of a slow tongue. And the Lord said unto him, Who hath made man's mouth? or who maketh the dumb, or deaf, or the seeing, or the blind? have not I the Lord?" (Exodus 4:10-11). In other words, "Speak, and I will make this work."

Most of us, in spite of however grieved we may be, can understand and make sense of the moral failures that happen in our churches and among the ministry. At the end of the day we cry with the offenders and the offended, while acknowledging our own humanity. We humbly accept the consequences that sin brings and seek solutions for all concerned and we go on. It's never pleasant, but when handled appropriately, the core doctrinal positions of the church go undisturbed.

There is, however, another kind of failure that happens in churches and among men. It creates deep anguish and despair, it is not easy to overcome, and ultimately leads to dissolution both physically and spiritually. It cracks the foundations. It is not simply the common moral failure of weak, careless persons. It is something else entirely. It is the harsh work of "certain men," smashing foundations, making disciples unto themselves. Men who have crept into the churches unawares, under false pretenses, under false promises that they will maintain the churches' doctrinal commitments. They boldly and deliberately manipulate the Word of God, while exploiting people's consciences and their money. "For there are certain men crept in unawares, who were before of old ordained to this condemnation, ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying the only Lord God, and our Lord Jesus Christ" (Jude 1:4).

Now is the time to speak. Many people in our churches and our nation can see the foundations crumbling, but many apparently do not. The headlines scream the warnings daily. Television, still Americans' number one influence, is mostly trash. It does not lift, it dumbs down. It unashamedly provides Americans clear examples of their own moral and spiritual chaos. Yet the nation laps it up and asks for more. As our churches slip into carelessness toward holiness and separation from the world, we too must ask the question - is there no off button? Will the party just roll on into an endless night? Will we take notice of our own crumbling foundations?

The cracking foundations are clearly visible in the culture and in the church. One does not need the perfect song or the perfect sermon before getting involved. However, we do need the perfect passion to speak, to vote, and to attend meetings. The spoken word, the counter-attack, and the rebuttal can make a difference. Resist the devil. "Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you" (James 4:7). "Of these things put them in remembrance, charging them before the Lord that they strive not about words to no profit, but to the subverting of the hearers" (2 Timothy 2:14).

"Ring the bells that still can ring." Ring the bell that you can ring. I understand there can be moral failure due to human weakness, but the evil deception involved in the twisting of scripture, the brazen robbery of godly people's labors and deconstruction of holiness convictions is not about some poor man's weakness in his flesh. It is a conspiracy of brazen flesh against God's righteousness. And it is not a little matter that is going to blow over. Now is the right time for good men and women to speak up. The cracks are there, for sure...

"But that's where the light gets in, and that's where the resurrection is and that's where the return, that's where the repentance is. It is with the confrontation, with the brokenness of things." - Leonard Cohen

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FAVORITE ONLINE STUDY TOOLS

Mark Harrelson, West Mobile, AL -- I do not use a computer Bible study program at present. When I switched from one operating system to the other, e-Sword wasn't available in that format. When I used e-Sword, I felt that it favorably compared to PC Study Bible and was mostly a free tool. I understand that Logos has an excellent platform, but I have never used it. I do, however, use the

free version of Blue Letter Bible for iPhone use. It has a good search feature and has my favorite translations. I use Bible Gateway extensively for search and multiple versions of Scripture. For interlinear reference, I use Bible Hub.



Daniel Criss, Uniontown, OH -- I have three computer programs I use: Power Bible CD, QuickVerse, and Master Christian Library. I like QuickVerse because it's easier to find a scripture I have in my mind than any other program I use, and I like the way it copies and pastes. Power Bible CD is my real study tool, though. The version I have has 15 Bible versions, Strong's, many commentaries,

lexicons, and much more. I've been using both of these programs for at least 15 years, and I rarely build a sermon without them. I can't say I use them every day, but it's very difficult to just read my Bible only without opening Power Bible and doing a little research.

I don't use any of the typical websites for Bible studies. I do occasionally use Chabad.org to do research if I can't find something in my Torah, Tanach, or Jewish History books. I also use a Bible app from YouVersion on my iPad. I like the way you can bookmark and save notes in that app.



Lonnie Samora, Arvada, CO -- I find PC Study Bible to be an invaluable tool for personal study and especially for preparing messages. It is so much easier to prepare a message when you can pop in and out of several lexicons and translations. At times, I find commentaries and Bible dictionaries to be very helpful as well. I have grown to depend so much on my PC Study Bible; I can't imagine not having it. I

am not much of a tech geek so I do not really use PowerPoint at all in my messages or Bible studies. We project the title and the scripture verses; that's enough.



David Bethel, Mineola, TX -- I used to use PC Study Bible and liked it very much. I now use Logos. I use it daily for the many references and cross references that are available, as well as the ability to search many different subjects and the daily devotions it offers. I also use a computer and an iPad. I would love PowerPoint but do not use it at present.



D. Mark Lashbrook, Algonquin, IL -- I do not use a computer Bible study program; however, I use Olive Tree on my Ipad. I use Internet sites exclusively on my laptop. I use blueletterbible.org several times a week, and I use PowerPoints once every few months as needed. I prepare my notes and my sermons on my computer or my Ipad.



Jeff Marchand, Shoreview, MN -- The Bible software that I use is a combination of both Logos and Sword Searcher. I use these programs multiple times throughout the week. They both are user-friendly and provide access to tremendous study tools. Blue Letter Bible is a source that I frequent daily, and I use Evernote to capture any seed thoughts that I receive through prayer, Bible reading, outside sources, etc. When it comes time to organize my thoughts, I use MS Word and create an outline format. This outline

will include Bible verses that I will copy/paste from the above-mentioned Bible programs.

I always use PowerPoint to create a graphical background to the sermon that I am preaching. I will, however, save the file as a JPEG so as not to compromise the content when I import it into the projection program that our church uses (Proclaim). After completing and saving the MS Word outline PowerPoint, I then will save these three files to my local computer as well as e-mail them to a designated sermon e-mail alias that stores every message that I've preached.



Joseph Miller, Magee, MS -- I use e-Sword; it's my only Bible program simply because for the most part it is free to download. I used it daily while evangelizing, and I now use it three to four times per week. It's very user friendly. I like how you can arrange the screens as you wish, and being able to maximize any portion of the screen makes it very easy to copy and paste scripture,

definitions of words, or portions of a commentary into my notes. I use BibleGateway.com for a Bible version that isn't on E-sword.

It's easy to access and to search. I use my computer to prepare my notes, then I convert them to PDF and transfer them to my Kindle. When I take my Kindle to the pulpit, I have all my scriptures right in my notes. To me, it helps me stay in the flow, and I don't have to turn pages in my Bible to find every scripture I've included in my notes. My Bible, however, isn't far away because there are moments when the Lord will quicken a scripture to me that isn't in my notes.

I've never been one to use PowerPoint very often; however, it does make the content of the message more memorable, especially when teaching.



Daniel Walter, Chester, VA – I use PC Study Bible, Logos, and WORDsearch quite regularly each week. I use Bible Gateway and Bible Study Tools for research while preparing handwritten notes. I then transfer my handwritten notes by typing them in on my laptop for memory's sake. I rarely ever PowerPoint a sermon but usually do when it comes to Bible studies.



Luis Rodriguez, Daytona Beach, FL – I just started using Olive Tree Bible app on my iPad, but I still value the traditional leather-bound Bible and a pen. I use Olive Tree every day. It seems to have quite a bit of features. I also use Bible Gateway and Google, and I have just started to prepare notes on my iPad, and I am preparing to use PowerPoints soon as well.

Deborah and Gordon Parrish III Fairbanks, AL

If you are looking for a great place to worship, raise your children and become part of a wonderful family of believers, then you've come to the right place. The Sanctuary United Pentecostal Church of Fairbanks, Alaska, pastored by Bro. Gordon Parrish III, is truly a special place, a multicultural place, a place where people of diverse cultures become one spiritual family. Their doors will always be open for all. Through the years, hundreds

of people just like you have received their very own life-changing New Birth experience at The Sanctuary. Their priority is to help each person find, develop and maintain their own relationship with the Lord.

Bro. Parrish has been a pastor for 39 years and is currently the district superintendent of the Alaska-Yukon district, and serves on the United Pentecostal Church of Canada's Board of Directors as well. His previous positions include district youth president, home missions secretary, district paper editor, and district board member. Bro. Parrish and his wife, Deborah, have three children: Jennifer [37], Gordon IV [33], and Michael [31]. Born and raised in southern Illinois, Bro. Parrish was just

five years old when his mother came into the church under Bro. Calvin Rigdon's ministry. "Before the age of nine I was baptized and received the Holy Ghost," explains Bro. Parrish. "By the time I was twelve I had guit attending church but in 1971, when I was 21 years old, I prayed back through and shortly thereafter I felt a calling to pastor and began preparing myself. When I approached my pastor [Bro. Lester Caraway, Herrin, Illinois] his response was, 'I thought you would be coming to me about this.' In the summer of 1972, I met and married my beautiful wife Deborah. I then enrolled in Gateway College of Evangelism in St. Louis. During the first year, I felt a very strong calling to go back to Alaska and in the summer of '73, we loaded everything



we had into a car and an old pickup truck bed that had been chopped off the cab and drove the 4,200 miles to Fairbanks. We remained in Fairbanks, attending and working in the church that we now pastor. In 1975, we opened a church in Delta Junction, located about 100 miles from Fairbanks, and remained there until June 1978. June 2, 1978 was my installation service in the church that we currently pastor."

Principles of Growth & Revival

Bro. Parrish is armed with a vision to help every one of the pastors in the Alaska-Yukon district grow their church in number and maturity by providing for them what he calls the three M's of evangelism: methods, means and motivation. "For our church family we provide methods (ideas, programs, drives, etc.), means (materials, finances, etc.), and motivation," explains Bro. Parrish. "By promoting evangelism each service and through the programs that encourage outreach, a pastor is motivating the congregation by showing them what is important to him as the pastor.

Bro. Parrish believes the most important key to having a growing church is to develop a "growth atmosphere" within the church. "This would include establishing a vision for growth by preaching/teaching that the purpose of the church is to reach the lost, and to retain (or disciple) those that come in," he says. "Much effort goes into creating a growth atmosphere such as helping your congregation feel good about who they are and what they are doing for the kingdom. Each person needs to find their place of involvement within the church - a ministry that they enjoy doing.

Every Thursday evening, Bro. Parrish meets with young adults for Ministers In Training (M.I.T.). While teaching them principles of leadership, character, etc., he helps them find their place of ministry. "For those involved, I tend to see a greater degree of commitment and involvement within the Kingdom, a greater sense of purpose," said Bro. Parrish. "A pastor's priorities should focus primarily on equipping the church members for ministry. A pastor will do well by establishing priorities in ministry and staying with them. Consistency is a builder; inconsistency is a killer.

Organization & Management

Bro. Parrish firmly believes in organization, especially in those areas requiring training. "We have quarterly staff meetings and an annual planning session," explains Bro. Parrish. "I meet with individual department heads weekly. For each 'position' in the church one must go through our written guidelines of requirement and agree to live that standard of life.'

Personal Ministry

Bro. Parrish' philosophy of ministry is pretty simple: minister to the needs. "My advice (when asked) is don't waste your time answering questions that aren't being asked," says Bro. Parrish. "Obviously, the lost need to be found and the saints need help in dealing with the issues of life. Basically, this is my ministry. As far as my target group, we are a multicultural church. No group or individual is out of bounds for us.'

Special Miracles

Through the years, The Sanctuary has experienced several



miracles: cancers healed, etc. The most notable miracle, however, was a 4-year-old girl that was hit by a truck in front of their church. She was without question deceased. During a frantic prayer in the street, she was raised to life.

"Shannon lived across the street and often came to our house to play with my daughter, Jennifer," explains Bro. Parrish. "Both were the same age and enjoyed each other's company. On this particular day, Shannon had been playing with Jennifer but decided to go to her home to pick up something for them both to snack on. I was working on the outside of our church, along with some members of our church, when I heard the sliding of tires across wet pavement. I quickly turned toward the street in time to see the pickup truck hit Shannon, throwing her 20-plus feet through the air. Once on the pavement she didn't move. Her bicycle was tangled and crushed underneath the truck. I quickly ran toward her, giving instructions to one of our men to call an ambulance. When in the military I had received some emergency medical training, and I know that you can cause more severe

damage to an injured person by moving them so I was cautious. I first checked for any signs of life, wrist pulse, neck pulse, heartbeat, etc. I then put my face next to her mouth but could not detect any breathing. Shannon's face looked as though all of the bones were broken on the left side. Later we could see where her face had dented the front hood of the truck. I also noticed a cut on her forehead, which was opened, and to her skull. There was no bleeding, which is another indication that her heart wasn't beating. From her ears came what looked like a mixture of blood and clear fluid, indicating brain damage. At this point, I realized that Shannon was gone and that I wouldn't do any more damage by taking her in my arms, so I did so. As I knelt there in the middle of the street holding Shannon,

Ir emember feeling almost obsessed to pray for her, and I started crying out, "Jesus, help this baby; Jesus, help this baby." At some point, I opened my eyes to see what seemed like the entire neighborhood standing around us. The odd thing that I noticed was that they were all staring at me and not really looking at this little girl. Looking back, they must have thought that I was beside myself with grief and had simply 'lost it.' As I continued (almost screaming) "Jesus, help this baby," I saw Shannon's mother and father jump from their front porch and run toward us. As her mother knelt beside me, I tried to hand Shannon to her mother. She pushed Shannon back to me while crying, "No, pray, pray!" I'm not sure how much time went by; it couldn't have been more than a few minutes when all of a sudden, Shannon inhaled a deep breath, her arms and legs shot out and she began to cry. At that point, an ambulance was on the scene, and they immediately put her on a stretcher and took her to the hospital.

"This all took place around 8 p.m. on a summer night. I quickly changed clothes and went to be with the family at the

hospital. At about 11 p.m. I saw their family truck pull into their yard, and the most amazing thing happened. Shannon got out of the truck, walked over to her wadded-up bicycle, kicked the tire, stood there a minute and then walked into her house.

"The next day a knock came at my front door. It was Shannon. She was dressed in her nicest dress and carrying a little gift for me from her mother. I invited her in and immediately began looking at her face, which the evening before had looked to have the consistency of cottage cheese. Everything now looked normal. I couldn't resist lifting her little dress to see where the truck had hit the left side of her body. From the top to the bottom, there was not one bruise to be found."

Current Facility

This past Easter was the first service for The Sanctuary in its new auditorium. They have been in a building program for several years and have just completed buildings 5, 6, and 7 of an Schuilding project. Total square footage for their church is just over

8-building project. Total square footage for their church is just over 23,500 square feet. The seating capacity for their new auditorium is just over 500. They continue to work on their current project, paying as they go.

"As far as numbers in church, we live in a very transient area," says Bro. Parrish. "Fairbanks has a strong military presence, and people come and go every couple of years. Those who come to Alaska for work or pleasure often tend to leave when they finish what they came for. Fairbanks can be a difficult place to live considering the extreme weather conditions. When folks come to church and the temperature is 40 degrees below zero or colder, we give them a certificate. (This practice started as tongue-in-cheek, but we found that we all take it pretty seriously.) The winter weather here is lifethreatening, and one can never forget that. Thinking back over our records, since I came here as pastor, we have baptized between 2,500 and 3,000, and most of those received the Holy Ghost."

Plans for the Future

Bro. Parrish is excited about the future, the remainder of his building program and what the Lord has in store for The Sanctuary.

"I am just as excited about the Lord's work today as ever," says Bro. Parrish. "I will continue to be a revivalist, reaching for the lost and helping the saints in every way I can."

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Top Seven Desires of Pastors

Based on interviews with more than 20 pastors who had been in ministry for at least 25 years, Thom Rainer (president of LifeWay Christian Resources) compiled a list of the top seven regrets. All of the men interviewed were over 55 years old. While a few of them were retired, most were still active in full-time vocational ministry. After each regret listed, a representative direct quote is provided from one of the interviewees.

1. Lack of practical training for local church ministry. "I wish I had taken time to find some resources or places where I could get practical training. I had to learn in the school of hard knocks, and it was very painful at times." 2. Overly concerned about critics. "My regret is that

I spent way too much time and emotional energy dealing with the critics. I think of the hundreds of hours I lost focusing on critics, and it grieves me to this day." *3. Failure to exercise faith.* "At some point in my ministry, I started playing defense

and let the status quo become my way of doing church. I was fearful of taking steps of faith, and my leadership and churches suffered as a result."

4. Not enough time with family. "I can't say that people didn't warn me. One wise pastor told me I had a mistress. When he saw my anger rising, he told me that my mistress was busyness in my church, and that my family was suffering from neglect."

5. Failure to understand basic business and finance issues. "The first time I saw my church's budget, I thought I was looking at a foreign language. I really felt stupid in so many of the discussions about the budget or other church business issues."

6. Failure to share ministry. "I had two complexes. The first was the Superman complex. I felt like if ministry was going to be done well, I had to do it. I couldn't ask or equip someone else to do it. My second complex was 'conflict avoider.' I was so afraid that I would get criticized if I didn't visit Aunt Susie personally when she had an outpatient

procedure that I ran myself ragged." *7. Failure to make friends.* "I know it's a cliché, but being a pastor can be lonely. I wish I had done a better job of seeking out true friends. I know if I had made the effort, there would have been a number of pastors in town that I could have befriended."

Currently, I am providing teacher training and children's ministry to churches across the country, in addition to my fulltime work at KYCC Radio in Stockton.

What would you recommend a church do to improve their children's ministry?

Before assessing what to improve, first look at what you are doing well and give credit where credit is due. I think sometimes we are guilty of focusing on our failures versus celebrating our successes.

Somewhere in your children's ministry there is a staff member who is doing an excellent job, and there are children who are being effectively reached.

Take the time to highlight and celebrate what you are doing right before tackling what you are doing wrong or not doing at all.

That's great advice. Once we have done that, where should we begin making changes?

A lesson I have learned in radio is to pay attention to the audience reaction regarding any song or program that we play. By the same token, we should pay attention to the kids' reactions to everything in our ministry.

Do they enjoy Sunday school or do they have to be dragged to church? I remember one Sunday in particular when I saw a bunch of our kids running to children's church. I took that as a very good sign.

There are three key areas of your operation you can inspect for possible improvement: staff, culture and facilities. Regarding staff, I would ask myself: Is the leadership adequately trained for the job they have been assigned? Is the staff effective, well-trained and valued? Is the staff communicating well with leadership and vice versa? Have we run background checks on every staff member?

A happy staff makes for a happy leader. My job as children's pastor is much easier if my staff members are content in their roles.

I am obviously a huge fan of teacher training and would highly recommend that all Sunday school teachers attend a training event at least once a year, if not more. There are untapped resources all around; take advantage of them.

Regarding background checks, I have discovered that this is an area of neglect in many churches. It needs to be regarded as a priority.

You mentioned "culture." What do you mean?

I am talking about the overall atmosphere and spirit of the children's ministry. For example: Are the spiritual needs of the kids being met? Do the kids enjoy the ministry from week to week? Do kids absolutely know they are valued at our church? Are visiting kids returning a second and third time? Is our curriculum helping us reach our goals? Is the ministry growing?

Regarding "value," I applaud any church that is successfully communicating to its kids that they are valued. For many, the Sunday school class is the single haven of peace in their lives. Let's convey to them how much they are loved, both by God and by us.

Talk about facilities for a moment.

It has long been my contention that we (mistakenly) design our churches, our facilities and our lobbies for adults.

When an 8-year-old boy arrives at your front door, do your facilities tell him that he is a priority and that he is welcome?

Are the greeters greeting him, or greeting only his parents? Is it a place where he feels immediately comfortable, or is he being forced to enter a "grownup's world"? Take a good look at your lobby and your facility through his eyes. Ask yourself: Is our facility decorated in a child-friendly way? What elements in our lobby tell kids that they are important to us? Do our facilities provide a safe area for the kids?

If you are not careful, you and your facilities will convey the signal to kids that they are "second-class citizens" of your church, instead of the priority they need to be.

At the end of the list you mention a "safe area."

I have been to a lot of churches that have not made child safety a top priority, and I just cringe. Even though I listed it last, it really is a priority of the highest degree. Take a good, hard, honest look at your facilities, and make absolutely sure the kids are safe. For example, if you are not using a check-in/check-out system, I strongly recommend you implement one.

It's a sobering fact: the horror stories are true. The time to make a change is not after something heartbreaking happens at your church.

This is a lot to consider all at one time.

You should then prioritize what needs changed first. Make a list: "Five Things We are Going to Change in 2014," then focus on the five, not the entire picture. At the end of the year, celebrate the five changes that you made, then make five more in 2015.

Good Leaders, Bad Decisions

A recent issue of Harvard Business Review OnPoint magazine featured a reprint of an article entitled, "Why Good Leaders Make Bad Decisions." The writers recount the story of Brigadier General Matthew Broderick, chief of the Home-

land Security Operations Center, who was responsible for alerting government officials if Hurricane Katrina breached the levees in New Orleans. Instead of making the call for help, Broderick ignored early reports of potential levee breaches and went home.

Broderick was a military man. The article points out that he was used to making decisions in "fog of war" environments. "These experiences had taught him that early reports surrounding a major event are often false and it's better to wait for the 'ground truth' from a reliable source before acting" (Campbell, Whitehead, Finkelstein, HBR OnPoint, Summer 2014). In his defense, it does appear that there was a great deal of confusion and conflicting reports.

In a time of great chaos in our nation and culture, this is no time to claim "fog of war" and hesitate to call a warning, and it is certainly not time to go home and bar the doors. Satan has come in like a flood and the levees are being breached.

I work with many young people at Indiana Bible College and sadly, the reports are coming back mixed. Sure, there are churches having revival and staying faithful to this one God message and Apostolic lifestyle, but we also hear reports of a serious lack of Bible knowledge among youth and a growing trend to embrace worldliness and carnality, as well as a general desensitization toward the moving of the Spirit.

Details are sketchy; but if we are honest, we have to admit at the very least we are not progressing fast enough. Bible schools overseas have more than doubled in 20 years despite financial and political adversity while in the past three decades in North America, we've closed more Bible colleges than we've opened. Our UPCI-endorsed colleges in North America have better facilities than ever before, faculties with Ph.D. scholars and anointed teachers yet most struggle to increase enrollment. Simply put . . . shouldn't we be encouraging more of our Apostolic youth to answer the call?

New Orleans will never be the same . . . buildings and lives are lost forever. Broderick is not responsible for the storm, the botched disaster response, or other failures that made up the tragedy of Katrina, but he did have a window of opportunity to sound an alarm. When we see dangerous trends, should we wait and see how far these will go? The disaster awaiting our churches and families may be irrecoverable.

How should we handle questions asking if we could affirm something like the following, "We believe there is one God, eternally existent in three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit"?

Well, simply stated, we say we cannot. But when dealing with people outside our movement, instead of rushing

Bobby Killmon to show them our position is biblical and better way forward is to sometimes show that their own revered ministers have rejected this too. An IBC alumnus was confronted on the mission field with this exact guestion. Their answers, using the above approach, confounded the questioners. Because of special circumstances where they were employed, they were asked to speak with the head of the Baptist movement in that country. At the conclusion he said, "You don't need to worry about signing this affirmation."

Here's what I counseled our alumnus to say: I absolutely believe in one God, but I am not comfortable saying God "existed eternally as three persons." However, theologians like Frank Stagg, who taught at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, says that while he acknowledges the full deity of Christ he, like you, rejects the Nicean formulation of God as persons. Even W. A. Criswell in his book on Heaven said "...the only God you will see in heaven is Jesus." He was the president of the Southern Baptist Convention, was called one of their greatest expository preachers, and led the "conservative resurgence" in the SBC. So, we are more comfortable saying modes or manifestations of the one God.

In denominal circles, there are many rejecting these Trinitarian affirmations, and pressure is increasing on some to hedge or accommodate the language of trinity. Some Apostolics, learning they can sell more books or be on more platforms preaching or singing, have tried to accommodate the language in some way. This is a terrible approach born out of a compromised and backslidden heart seeking the wrong things.

The best way forward is to point out the severe difficulties in these denominal movements with people who do not acknowledge non-biblical understanding, terms or constructs regarding God. For instance, a minister friend showed me another current example in David K. Naugle, a Distinguished University Professor Chair and Professor of Philosophy at Dallas Baptist University for 23 years. He makes some fascinating admissions in his book entitled A Student's Guide (Reclaiming the Christian Intellectual Tradition). In his section about admitting presuppositions or "starting assumptions" he confesses he might be approaching scripture in a faulty way. He says, "If God did use the medium of his deeds and words in history to make himself known, then to reason abstractly about him could be rightly called 'faithless rebellion.'" (pg. 36) He further admits, "In so expressing God the Trinity, we must ask if we are departing from our commitment to knowing God on the basis of his acts and words in history. Possibly, but hopefully not." (pg. 39) What a candid admission. He "hopes" that in arguing for a trinity he's not engaging in abstract reasoning amounting to but "hopefully not ... faithless rebellion."

We are in a powerful day. Let's not adopt terrible things the denominal world is laying aside because of pressure to be liked or invited into certain places. The approach of showing their own movements struggle with nonbiblical views is a better way forward. Never compromise the Bible. God always has a better way.

What are the keys to a growing church?

Kennon L. Callahan, in his best-selling book *Twelve* Keys to an Effective Church, provides a list of 12 elements T. W. Massengale that usually exist in growing

churches. He contends that at least nine of these 12 keys should be present if a church wishes to grow effectively and consistently. Look over the list and see how you compare:

Specific and concrete growth and 1. evangelism goals. They know exactly where they want to go each year.

2. Weekly visitation by pastor and church members to visitors. Also visitation is made to absentees and other evangelism prospects.

3. Strong, dynamic – yet compassionate - worship and preaching services.

4. Significant emphasis on involvement by members and converts in various ministries and small groups of the church. At least 70% involvement.

5. Strong leadership, with an emphasis upon training current and future laity for significant leadership involvement.

6. An effective organizational structure that includes active participation by the various lay ministry leaders in the decision-making process.

7. Several competent ministries and programs that serve the membership and new converts in spiritual growth and evangelism, such as: Sunday School, Home Bible Study, Men's and Women's Ministry, Youth Ministry, New Convert Care, Visitor Follow-up, etc.

8. An open and accessible location near major traffic patterns and communities.

Adequate sanctuary and facilities for worship and Christian education. Simply put: there's room to grow.

10. Adequate parking and land for future expansion. They purchase land with the future in mind.

11. A high degree of visibility – both in the physical location of the facility and in the community life and news.

12. Solid financial resources to keep the church's ministries and program functioning. Growing churches are giving churches.

Four Steps to a Simpler Financial Life

Making An Altar Call "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls"

Recently I was asked in what type of services I would make an altar call. My quick response was "all." I wish I had a camera ready for their reaction when I said that. After their seconds of silence, I elaborated by saying I would make an altar call in Christmas plays, Easter plays, hallelujah parties, communion services and mid-week services, too.

Acts 2:41.

Years ago, Bishop Kilgore said the turning point in growth for the Apostolic church he pioneered in Houston was when they started placing a premium on altar services. The reality is, what good does it do to teach and preach forgiveness if we don't give anyone a chance to respond and receive it? The answer is none. That same idea goes for deliverance, the Holy Ghost, healing and wholeness. Altar calls are the most important part of a service.

Here are the four things necessary for a great altar service:

1) Drawing – Yes, we should make a formal appeal. But there must also be a "drawing" of the Spirit on someone. The work we do must be by the Spirit. Jesus Himself stated the imperativeness of this. "No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him" (John 6:44).

2) Order – Orderly altar calls simply produce greater results. Remember God is a God of order. Witness the universe, creation and the plan of redemption. Jesus sat them in companies, very orderly, before doing the miracle of multiplication in Mark 6.

3) Instruction – Often, hopefully, our altars are full of unchurched people. Even when not, reminders are needed. Do not assume people know what prayer is, how to repent, what the Holy Ghost is, or how to receive it. Take time to explain.

4) Anointing – There is an anointing that will break chains, liberate souls, bring deliverance and see results. If you are God-called you have it, but like any muscle you must exercise it! This gift is not for a select few.

you want to purchase a home in five years? Are your kids heading off to college soon? Is buying a car a top priority next year? during that trip?

The answer is yes as long as certain guidelines are followed.

Churches often provide benefits to their pastor besides the normal compensation and this may include the reimbursement of a spouse's travel expense while accompanying the pastor on a trip. In many cases, this would normally be a taxable transaction for the pastor's wife.

However, if the church promotes accountability through the spouse's presence, the amount would not normally be taxable. A church can require that the spouse attend these various functions with the pastor for accountability purposes which in their opinion would reduce the risk of inappropriate conduct by the minister or stop any false accusations that could be devastating to the minister and/or the church.

If the expenses are accountable and are maintained according to the IRS Code, and if there is written documentation from the Church requesting that the pastor's spouse attend the functions, then this could be construed that the benefits paid for the spouse's trip could be a normal business expense.

The church would need to establish a spousal accountability policy in writing and would need to require the spouse to maintain documentation of the expenditures the same as anyone else being reimbursed or having expenses paid for them. Please consult professional assistance before establishing the spousal accountability policy.

THAT'S OUTRAGEOUS

University Must Promote Christian Professor



A federal court ruled recently that the University of North Carolina-Wilmington must promote Mike Adams and pay him \$50,000. Earlier the court

found the university had retaliated against the criminology professor for his conservative views by denying him a full professorship.

Adams, a former atheist, converted to Christianity in 2000. Despite being published extensively in peer-reviewed publications and an overwhelming number of positive reviews from students, Adams' application for promotion in 2006 was denied.

Colleagues of Adams had called him a "wannabe right-wing pundit," a "pathological liar" and "mentally unbalanced." David French, senior counsel at the American Center for Law and Justice, said that played a part in the outcome.

"This ruling sends a message to public universities," he said. "Academic freedom isn't just for the Left, it's a constitutional right for all professors – even Christian conservatives." Featured on Townhall.com, Adams' columns cover many topics, including academic freedom, abortion, homosexuality, religion and morality.

In 2011, the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals found that the First Amendment protects Adams' right to his own opinion. "No individual loses his ability to speak as a private citizen by virtue of public employment," the judges wrote. "Such topics plainly touched on issues of public, rather than private concern."

"Disagreeing with an accomplished professor's religious and political views is no grounds for denying him a promotion," said Travis Barham, litigation staff counsel with the Alliance Defending Freedom. "The court's order rights the wrong done to Dr. Adams by granting him the full professorship he has long deserved."

Adams said he's just glad the case has come to a close. "This has been a long seven-year legal battle, and I'm exhausted," he wrote in a recent column. "Thank you all so much for your prayers and support. They have helped me make it through another year and to end it with an incredible victory. We serve a mighty God, indeed."



KJV: Fastest Growing, Most Popular Bible Translation

When Americans reach for their Bibles, more than half pick up a King James Version (KJV), according to a new study by historian Mark Noll. The 55 percent who read the KJV easily outnumber the 19 percent who read the New International Version (NIV). And the percentages drop into the single digits for competitors such as the New Revised Standard Version, New America Bible, and the Living Bible.

The findings were published by the Center for the Study of Religion and American Culture at Indiana University–Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI). The numbers are surprising, given the strong sales of NIV translations in bookstores. The NIV has topped the bestselling Bible translation list for decades, and continued to sell robustly in 2013.

But the high numbers of KJV readers confirm the findings of last year's American Bible Society (ABS) State of the Bible report. It was found that 52 percent of Americans read the King James or the New King James Version, compared with 11 percent who read the NIV.

The KJV also received almost 45 percent of the Bible translation-related searches on Google, compared with 24 percent for the NIV. In fact, searches for the KJV seem to be rising distinctly since 2005, while most other English translations are staying flat or are declining.

Other studies also indicate that the KJV remains the translation powerhouse. A 2011 Lifeway study, for example, found 62 percent of Americans—and 82 percent of Americans who regularly read the Bible—own a copy of the KJV. "Although the bookstores are now crowded with alternative versions, and although several different translations are now widely used in church services and for preaching, the large presence of the KJV testifies to the extraordinary power of this one classic English text," Noll commented.

But IUPUI also found that fewer Americans read their Bibles every day—just 9 percent, less than the 13 percent recorded by Barna and half of the 18 percent found by Lifeway. IUPUI also noted several main tells: You're more likely to read the Bible if you're female (56% compared with 39% of men), African American (70% read at least once a year, compared with 46% of Hispanics and 44% of whites), and older (56% of those over 70 years old, compared with 44% of those between 18 and 29). You're also more likely to read the Bible if you live in the South (61%) rather than the Northeast (36%).

■ Recent studies show Facebook reading is more popular than the Bible in the U.S. and Canada. Facebook reports about 143 million people log on to read Facebook posts every day compared to a 2006 poll which found about 40 million people in the U.S. and Canada read the Bible every day.

■ Results from a recent survey suggest that scientists and Christians are not as incompatible as one might think. In fact, 2 million out of nearly 12 million scientists are strong evangelical Christians.

LEGAL TRENDS

Atheists Launch Lawsuit Over Ground Zero Cross

American Atheists is demanding that the 17-foot crossbeam, a familiar site for visitors to Ground Zero, be

removed or altered to add an atheist monument of similar proportions. The cross has become a centerpiece in the new National September 11 Memorial and Museum, a towering steel



beam that became a symbol of hope after it was found among the wreckage of the World Trade Center.

"The overwhelming impression of this cross is religious," Edwin Kagin, the national legal director for American Atheists, told a New York federal appeals court. "We are worried about the alienation being suffered by atheists. This cross screams Christianity, but there were perhaps 500 or 1,000 people who died in this tragedy who were not Christians."

The group is appealing a lower court ruling which said that placing the cross in the museum did not breach the first Amendment clause that separates religion and government because the artifact has a "secular purpose."

Millennials Consume Content Every Waking Hour

Millennials, who are defined as those born from the early 1980s to the early 2000s, are giving new meaning to the "always-on" consumer because they are on even when they are supposed to be off. Millennials are apparently spending 18 hours per day consuming media. The hours are compounded, meaning that a person watching TV and checking Instagram at the same time for one hour would rack up two hours of media consumption — one for each device. That's according to new research from Crowdtap, a social analytics platform.

Crowdtap partnered with Ipsos MediaCT to survey 839 Millennial men and women online in January 2014.

Calling them "always-on consumers" alone doesn't appear accurate, though. Crowdtap says 30% of Millennials' media time is spent with content created and curated by their peers, which means they are also acting as "always-on publishers."

Broken down, Millennials spend 18% of their time on social networking sites, which is still less than the 20% of time they spend browsing the Internet, though those two likely overlap. They spend 13% of their time watching live TV and 10% watching pre-recorded TV.

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a good report" (Hebrews 11:1-2).

Faith is that element in a child of God's life that looks beyond the circumstance and sees beyond the dilemma. True faith looks beyond the darkness of a night and sees the breaking of a brand new day. Faith has the ability to comprehend the process even when I do not understand what may be going on in my life and give me an assurance God is working!

God Spoke of Faith Often

Take some time to look into the Word of God, and you will began to realize that faith is something God spoke about often. The Bible lets me know that He has given to every man a measure of faith. As Jesus ministered while on this earth, we encounter Him often being impressed by the faith of others. ears and hear the Word of God, because without a doubt there is something about the preaching of the Word of God that brings faith into our life. God is not slack concerning His promise, but He is faithful. God will never let us down; He will never leave nor forsake us. God will never turn His back on your life in a moment of trial. You need to hear that because it will produce faith in your life and in mine. I believe that faith comes by the preaching of the Word of God.

We Must Believe

The Bible says without faith it is impossible to please Him, for they that come to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him. That tells me HE is the answer. Someone in this place needs to believe He is the answer to cancer, He is the answer to revival, and He is the answer to disease. He's the answer to marital strife and struggle. He IS the answer, He is the only answer. If you are going to activate your faith, if you're going to move in faith, there are some things you've got to understand. The first thing you have to understand is that faith comes by the preaching of the Word of God. Faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God. Faith comes when a preacher opens his mouth and declares unto you the might, the majesty and the power of God. Something is activated in your life when you begin to hear the Word and mix it with your faith.

Even when it doesn't feel right, even when it goes against the grain, even when everything you're going through is contrary to what the preacher's preaching, you just have to have faith. Sometimes we find ourselves in situations where we do not understand what the outcome is going to be. We may not know what tomorrow is going to hold. If you and I are not careful we can begin to allow our carnal nature to get the best of us, and we will give in to the circumstances. We may be quick to throw in the towel and say, "I see no way through this." I hope before I am finished preaching this tonight I can drive that out of your mind and out of your heart. I want you to realize that with God all things are possible!

He's called us to be a victor. He has called us to be an overcomer. I am afraid at times we too easily and too passively accept circumstances as they are. We roll over and let our enemy convince us that nothing is going to change so we just accept things as they are. I believe God wants us to quit thinking like vagabonds and begin thinking like children of the King and begin to open our mouth and declare – "If God be for us who can be against us."

Speak Faith

Hebrews declared it – "He that cometh to God must believe that He is!" That is what brings me to God – My faith that HE IS!
